Some Thoughts about “New”

Some thoughts about “New”- as we enter a New Year of Grace, the time which our patient God has been giving us to prepare for the return of His beloved Son as Judge of the living and the dead.

Much is attractive about what is new.

For examples,

- a brand new shiny car with no dents or scratches and even a new smell,
- or a newly built home without the marks and wear that living brings.

The very first Sunday of the year points us to the Baptism of Our Lord

- and since we are baptized “into Christ”
- it points to us too.

And our Baptism is about our being made new every day!

Lutherans sometimes are intimated by people, usually of an evangelical persuasion, who tell us that our Baptism doesn’t count. They call it a “water Baptism” and claim it has nothing to do with true Baptism, which they equate with their experience of being born again at a very specific time. Making this a valid experience involves such things as being of a certain age-- old enough to make a personal decision to follow Christ and being able to express that decision with a profession of faith.

But infant Baptism is what we, along with the majority of Christians around the world and through the centuries, understand as one of the means of grace -- available also for babies when things like sermons cannot be comprehended due to their developmental limits. In other words, **HOLY BAPTISM IS NOT EFFECTIVE BECAUSE OF WHAT WE CAN DO**, but as a means of **grace** (undeserved love) it is effective purely because of what God does.

The verbs that refer to Holy Baptism in the New Testament are all PASSIVE-- that is, we are **baptized**, we are given the new birth of water and the Spirit. **IT HAS NOTHING TO DO WITH WHAT WE ARE CAPABLE OF DOING**. Otherwise, we might also presume that if we become extremely ill and lose consciousness, our Baptism could no longer be of any real effect or provide any comfort and strength.



There is much to study here-- but nothing for Lutherans to be apprehensive about at all as the NEW Testament is studied....

But back to the point. Just because grace is NOT about what we can do, we can actually be brand shiny new each day of our lives. Baptism establishes a wonderfully welcoming home for us, like that of the Prodigal Son, complete with a waiting Heavenly Father running to greet us. We sin daily, and daily in the power of our Baptism, we go home to be forgiven and renewed.

“If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come.”
- 2 Corinthians 5:17

That is baptismal talk...

Many of our readers may remember once memorizing the following words from the Catechism on The Sacrament of Holy Baptism.

“*What does such baptizing with water indicate?*

“It indicates that the Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, AND THAT A NEW MAN SHOULD DAILY EMERGE AND ARISE TO LIVE BEFORE GOD IN RIGHTEOUSNESS AND PURITY FOREVER.

“*Where is this written?*

“St. Paul writes in Romans, chapter 6. We were therefore buried (NOTICE THE PASSIVE!) with Him through Baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.”

So have more than a wish for a Happy New Year. Receive it with the gift of God’s grace to you in Holy Baptism. Confidently expect it-- just because it **does not depend on what you have been able, or will be able, to do on your own.**




